

2025 FALL MEETING

The Fall meeting was held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and hosted by The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. With over 160 participants in attendance, the meeting provided a wonderful opportunity for learning as well as experiencing the vibrant City of Brotherly Love. On Thursday, in the Lotte Strauss Lecture, Dr. Faizan Malik outlined the role of DNA methylation in refining myoepithelial tumors as predominantly fusion-driven neoplasms. As the pathology community slowly grows to understand the role of methylation in soft tissue tumors, this was a very timely topic. 18 platforms and 51 posters were presented with topics of practical application, including the Novel Placental Health Score and many offered clinical or practical takeaways. At the Farber Landing lecture, Dr. Gino Somers shared his thoughts on leadership in academic pathology and shared his surfing skills with the audience.

Friday's programming was chaired by Dr. Maria Queenan and Dr. Benjamin Wilkins and focused on Immune Dysregulation Syndromes in the hematolymphoid system, digestive system, skin and lung. Each of the sessions combined pathologist and clinician presentations, highlighting the multidisciplinary efforts needed to care for patients with these syndromes. Of note, the memorial slide session for Dr. Kevin Bove was a beautiful tribute to his life and those with whom he shared his knowledge. The day rounded out with the banquet dinner in the Reading Terminal Market, which was followed by an EPIC dance party that I am sad to say I missed.



On Saturday, Children's Oncology Group members provided key updates on Ewing Sarcoma and Undifferentiated Round Cell Sarcomas with regards to the Molecular Characterization Initiative as well as quality improvement projects. Much of the group descended upon the Philadelphia Museum of Art which displays Van Gogh, Picasso and Andy Warhol to name a few! Finally on Sunday, there were some excellent perinatal symposia providing insight into In Utero Diagnosis, Interventions, Pathologic Consequences and Genetics chaired by Dr. Rebecca Linn and Dr. Angela Viaene.

Thanks to Dr. Ashlie Rubrecht and Dr. Bindu Challa for providing some pertinent details, as I could not attend in person this year.



25 YEARS AGO: FALL 2000

Taken from The SPP Newletter, Fall 2000

Fall 2000 comprised a landmark of sorts for the SPP Newsletter, as it marked its first electronic-only copy. This move resulted in significant savings to the Society, more flexible deadlines, and the optional use of expanded text and color. However, a whopping 140 members did not have a registered email address at that time, excluding them from broadcast email messages alerting them to new issues. A one-time last chance mailing was prepared for these members, with the understanding that all mailing would henceforth stop, and all members were exhorted to send an email address to the Society office.

President Claire Langston lauded the 2000 Fall meeting held in Vancouver as a paragon of beautiful fall weather, a superb Scientific Program, a fascinating lecture by Lotte Strauss Award winner Aniban Maitra, and an informative seminar on Embryology to Gene Identification moderated by Dagmar Kalousek. Particular thanks were given to Jim and Judy Dimmick and the BC Children's and Women's Health Centre for their work in making things run smoothly.

Challenges faced by the SPP included searches for a new PDP editor, Website editor, and a move of the website to Health IT, Inc. Another challenge faced by the PDP was a decline in journal submissions to one-half of the previous year. The Perinatal Group, led by Bob Bendon, continued to find ways to be integrated into the Society.

To this end, President Langston agreed to appoint an ad hoc Perinatal Steering Committee.
