SPP/USCAP Meeting in Boston, MA



The March Spring meeting in Boston was delightful! The Society for Pediatric Pathology (SPP) has begun their companion society standing with the United States and Canadian Academy of Pathology (USCAP) 114th Annual Meeting, and we were all able to meet under one roof – at the Boston Convention Center. I particularly enjoyed this single venue, as one did not need to brave the whipping winds around Boston's beautiful waterfront. The last time SPP met with USCAP, I think I was a resident!

On Saturday evening, the SPP had a lovely private reception for membership at the Omni Seaport Boston Hotel, hosted by Boston Children's Hospital Department of Pathology. It is always exhilarating (at least to me!) to be in a room with so many other like minds – not to mention those smarter than myself! Despite the recent challenges of travel, folks journeyed from across the country and the globe, and it was a pleasure to reconnect and to make new acquaintances and to see the fresh faces of recently graduated fellows and junior attendings, mingled with the stalwarts and leaders of our Society. I did miss the live music and talents of our own society members, but I am sure that there will be no shortage of such at the fall meeting in Philadelphia.

On Sunday morning, the Society had an excellent inaugural companion society symposium on Congenital Tumors. Over the two-hour symposium, Dr. **Linda Ernst** described the nuances of congenital tumors and their in utero effects; Dr. **Jason Jarzembowski** and Dr. **Miguel Reyes-Mugica** detailed the challenges of congenital neuroblastic tumors and congenital germ cell tumors, respectively; and Dr. **Karen Chisolm** reviewed the subtleties of congenital myeloproliferative disorders/leukemias. The topics were pertinent to most pediatric pathologists and combined relevant, basic clinical and histologic information along with newer challenges in the state of diagnosis in these areas.

After the morning companion meeting, an interlude allowed us to mingle with colleagues in various disciplines through other companion society meetings and gave us an opportunity to socialize. On Sunday evening, many programs participated in the bustling Fellowship Fair, meeting and greeting medical students, residents, new fellows, and new junior attendings, inspiring the next generation of pediatric pathologists.

The SPP organized an Expo Booth that allowed folks to represent their institution and the society as a whole. The booth provided education on the subspecialty of pediatric pathology and doubled as a place for folks to network and grab some SPP swag! The Expo Booth served as the starting point for poster walks moderated by SPP members for the Stowell Orbison, Pediatric/Perinatal and Gynecologic/Obstetric poster sessions. Hopefully, the poster walk will be a tradition that will continue to provide in person visibility of the Society and to serve as an engaging way to visit subspecialty posters and discuss findings with presenters.

Finally, on Monday evening, the Society had a specialty session chaired by Dr. **Jeff Goldsmith**, highlighting interesting bone and soft tissue, hematopathology, and central nervous system pediatric pathology cases in which molecular analysis was crucial to the diagnosis. The session highlighted the benefits and challenges of molecular testing in a world where we are doing so much more with less material. All of the recorded sessions are available through the USCAP Annual Meeting at their On Demand Platform.

Overall, the Companion Society status of SPP has been a positive move and hopefully will position pediatric pathology in the spotlight for continued growth and consistent exposure to future and current pathologists.

Enid Gilbert Barness Prize

The Enid Gilbert Barness Prize honors the achievements and contributions of Dr. Enid Gilbert Barness, the past president and life member of the SPP, to children's healthcare and to our specialty. The prize recognizes the impact of an outstanding pediatric pathology paper on anatomic pathology, clinical practice, research, or public health, and encourages excellence and relevance in pediatric pathology practice. The paper should be accepted or published in a peer reviewed journal during the past three calendar years (i.e., 2022-2024) by a member of the SPP who is the first or last author and the primary contributor to the work to be eligible for the prize.



The SPP 25 Years Ago

The Spring 2000 SPP Newsletter listed the activities of the Society in a variety of fronts, as detailed by President **Claire Langston**'s President's Message and by committee reports from the Spring 2000 meeting. Thanks to a favorable market, the funded resources of the SPP had significantly increased, in spite of a deficit budget. Progress and challenges regarding the Society organ *Pediatric and Developmental Pathology*, the year-end *Perspectives in Pediatric Pathology*, and the development of the new SPP website were detailed. After being shepherded by **Paul Dickman** in its developmental stages, website management was being transferred to a commercial firm. Finally, the Education Committee reported on substantial work accomplished by four subcommittees, the Workshop/symposium Subcommittee, the Abstract Subcommittee, the CME Subcommittee, and the Extramural Subcommittee.
